DIGGING DEEPER

Nehemiah 4:7-18 (NLT)

⁷ But when Sanballat and Tobiah and the Arabs, Ammonites, and Ashdodites heard that the work was going ahead and that the gaps in the wall of Jerusalem were being repaired, they were furious. ⁸ They all made plans to come and fight against Jerusalem and throw us into confusion. ⁹ But we prayed to our God and guarded the city day and night to protect ourselves.

¹⁰ Then the people of Judah began to complain, "The workers are getting tired, and there is so much rubble to be moved. We will never be able to build the wall by ourselves."

¹¹ Meanwhile, our enemies were saying, "Before they know what's happening, we will swoop down on them and kill them and end their work."

¹² The Jews who lived near the enemy came and told us again and again, "They will come from all directions and attack us!" ¹³ So I placed armed guards behind the lowest parts of the wall in the exposed areas. I stationed the people to stand guard by families, armed with swords, spears, and bows.

¹⁴ Then as I looked over the situation, I called together the nobles and the rest of the people and said to them, "Don't be afraid of the enemy! Remember the Lord, who is great and glorious, and fight for your brothers, your sons, your daughters, your wives, and your homes!"

¹⁵ When our enemies heard that we knew of their plans and that God had frustrated them, we all returned to our work on the wall. ¹⁶ But from then on, only half my men worked while the other half stood guard with spears, shields, bows, and coats of mail. The leaders stationed themselves behind the people of Judah ¹⁷ who were building the wall. The laborers carried on their work with one hand supporting their load and one hand holding a weapon. ¹⁸ All the builders had a sword belted to their side.

TAKING IT HOME

Over the next several verses Nehemiah and the people did some very specific things to stay encouraged. We will be cherry-picking the verses that demonstrate how they did it.

Nehemiah 3:1 (NLT)

Then Eliashib the high priest and the other priests started to rebuild at the Sheep Gate. They dedicated it and set up its doors, building the wall as far as the Tower of the Hundred, which they dedicated, and the Tower of Hananel.

Nehemiah 4:3-4a (NLT)

³ Tobiah the Ammonite, who was standing beside him, remarked, "That stone wall would collapse if even a fox walked along the top of it!"

⁴Then I prayed, "Hear us, our God, for we are being mocked.

10) What did Nehemiah do with Tobiah's statement?

Nehemiah 4:6 (NLT)

⁶ At last the wall was completed to half its height around the entire city, for the people had worked with enthusiasm.

11) How did the people work? How can we do that?

Nehemiah 6:2-3 (NLT)

 $^{\rm 2}$ So Sanballat and Geshem sent a message asking me to meet them at one of the villages in the plain of Ono.

But I realized they were plotting to harm me, ³ so I replied by sending this message to them: "I am engaged in a great work, so I can't come. Why should I stop working to come and meet with you?"

12) What did Nehemiah stay focused on, and how can we do the same?

Nehemiah did the following things well:

- He had a clear vision of what God was calling him to do.
- He took the people that were trying to discourage him to God in prayer.
- He celebrated the small victories. He didn't minimize them even though the whole wall wasn't built—he dedicated the small steps.
- He spoke encouragement to the people around him.
- He protected the work by guarding it.
- He let challenge fuel his determination.
- Most of all, he always put God first.

- 14) What do you need to stop doing to experience encouragement in your own life?
- 15) In thinking about Pastor Craig's example of the Lego set, how can you encourage others to take the next steps?
